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## CALLING SYCAMORE 4-3383 Bradford King

In the mid 1960's a telephone call to the number above connected you to Nuccio's Nurseries in Altadena. Julius or Joe Nuccio would most likely have taken your call. These brothers founded the camellia and azalea nurserv in 1935. In 1950 they introduced their first seedling 'Katherine Nuccio' and their first catalog and developed a mail order business. Joe's son Julius, whom we all know as Jude, joined the Nursery full time in 1957. Recently I was fortunate to receive three Nuccio Nurseries catalogs for 1965-66, 1966-67 and 1967-68. The catalogs were

of the azalea 'Nuccio's Pink Champagne'. It has a lovely light pink hose-in-hose flower and a one-gallon plant was priced at \$3.00. Today Nuccio's Nurseries sells this azalea for \$6. This is a bargain when you consider the rate of inflation. In 1965 a three-bedroom house in Pasadena would have cost \$40,000; today it would sell for at least \$600,000. The June 26, 2011 Los Angeles Times real estate section had an article about a house purchased in 1974 for \$234,000 in La Canada and presently listed for sale at 3.35 million.



fun to read and I would like to share some of the points of interest with you. By the way, Tom joined the family business in 1972 and Jim in 1980.

These catalogs are filled with beautiful colored pictures of camellias and azaleas before the era of digital cameras. The wonderful pictures on the covers of the 7 x 10 inch catalogs were the first things to catch my eye. The 32-page catalog sold for \$1.00 and could be deducted from the first purchase. The 1965-66 cover shows a champagne glass full "New Top Performance Camellias" were listed alphabetically on pages 3 through 5 in the Nuccio's catalogues with seven lovely photos of japonica camellias: 'Kramer Supreme', 'Silver Anniversary', 'Kickoff', 'Grand Slam', 'Spring Deb' and 'Cover Girl' and a new sasanqua N-60002 named 'Yuletide'. Two new camellias were selected from hundreds of 'Berenice Boddy' seedlings and offered for sale. They were 'Ace of Hearts', with a brilliant rose red semidouble flower, and 'Alexis Smith' with a very large semidouble blush pink flower with deeper pink petal edges. I have always wondered how 'Maroon and Gold' got its distinctive rich maroon color. The catalogue reports it is a seedling of 'Kuro Tsubaki', the black camellia.

Three well-written pages with clear drawings detail "How to Grow and Care for Fine Camellias" with page reference to The Sunset publication "How to Grow and Use Camellias." I have enjoyed and learned a great deal about plants and gardening from the Sunset Books. Today Sunset publishes a magazine that has very little about plants and gardening and focuses, instead, on home design, travel and recipes. We can be thankful that Nuccio's Nurseries has not lost its focus on camellias and azaleas over the last fifty years.

In these early catalogs there are several pages with wonderful photos of camellias offering collections for great prices. For example the "Blue special quality collections were offered as follows: "Great Favorites", "Big Four" (Reticulatas), "Gold Medal" and a "Top Sasanqua Special" of eight varieties for \$12.50.

The prolific Southern California camellia breeder, Harvey Short, had twenty of his introductions propagated by Nuccio's. Nuccio's Nurseries no longer list most of these cultivars. However, the Harvey Short varieties introductions offered in the Nuccio's 2010 catalog were 'Ballet Dancer' a medium full peony cream shading to a coral pink color on the flower edges, 'Firefalls', a glowing crimson medium to large full peony flower, 'Gay Chieftain', a large semidouble white flower with vivid red stripes, 'Masterpiece', a large white formal double to rose form double flower and 'Owen Henry', a light pink flower, a sport of 'Sunset Glory'. The latter flower is also a Harvey Short release. It is a large coral red anemone flower no longer listed in the current Nuccio's catalog.



Ribbon collection "includes ten cutting-grown 12-18" plants for \$22.50" which included the following camellias: 'Angel', 'Carter's Sunburst', 'Drama Girl', 'Guilio Nuccio', 'Coed', 'Mrs. D. W. Davis', 'Hawaii', 'Spring Sonnet', 'Tomorrow' and 'Wildwood'. In addition, other The catalogs I received are essentially the same with two important exceptions. First, there were new photos on the front and back covers for each year. Second, new varieties were introduced. The Nuccio breeding program states that "of the five to seven thousand seedlings that we bloom annually, 20 to 25 are selected for further testing, and from these three or four survive our year-to-year blooming test." The camellias passing the test for 1965-66 were 'Silver Ruffles', 'Berenice Beauty', 'Berenice Perfection', 'Freedom Bell' and 'Spring Deb.' In 1966-67 the new releases were 'Francie L.' and 'Cheryl Lynn'. The new Nuccio introductions for 1967-68 were 'Spring Fever', 'Matador' and 'Scentsation'. The bright red small nonreticulata semidouble flower of 'Freedom Bell' continues to be a popular cultivar that wins in camellia shows. It gained 50 points in American Camellia shows in 2010, which was good enough for fifth place as a hybrid.

In conclusion, I hope you enjoyed this brief trip into the past and can appreciate, as I do, the staying power of Nuccio's Nurseries.

## MY RETICS E. C. "Gene" Snooks

"Once Upon a Time," or more like "20 plus Years ago," I made a trip to Nuccio's Nurseries to buy some reticulata camellias and came home with seven plants. I planted all of them under a 50% shade lath house spaced on six-foot centers. The lath was placed running north and south, an important factor to get the light broken up as the sun travels from east to west.

My culture is rather simple. I fertilize with cottonseed meal with 10% Blood Meal plus iron three times a year on St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day and July 4th. Now that these plants are well established, they are watered only three times a year. This may seem impossible but, if they are properly spaced, this is sufficient. If we have an unusually dry year, a fourth watering may be needed. I usually spray with a mixture of fine oil and a systemic spray for control of mites. What have I learned about these plants? A lot. Let's look at each plant.

'Emma Gaeta Variegated' is a cross of 'Cornelian' and 'Mouchang'. It is a pure reticulata and, as expected, has a very open growth habit. It is a good grower though a very good grower friend, who has over 150 cultivars, has lost three plants of this cultivar. It does have one problem, which I call



"pseudo die-back. " I call it "pseudo" because it differs from ordinary die-back in that it does not advance through the plant until it kills the plant. This pseudo type just kills individual twigs. The flowers as they fall don't shatter which is a blessing. I frequently get a few nonvariegated blooms late in the season. It is a consistent winner and received the Harris Award in 1998 and the Charlotte C. Knox award in 1993.

'Terrell Weaver' is a cross between *C. reticulata* 'Crimson Robe' and *C. japonica* 'Ville De Nantes'. A wide-open grower, it is not recommended for most people. It too, suffers from pseudo die-back and requires constant twig pruning. The flowers shatter when they fall—another fault. They can be show winners if you can get the blooms to the show before they shatter. In spite of its faults, it received the Harris Award in 1988. It does set seed readily.

'LASCA Beauty' is a hybrid between ' Cornelian' and 'Mrs. D. W. Davis' and grows more japonica-like than the two previous cultivars. I have found it to be a bit slower in growth than all of the rest. The flowers fall whole and it sets seed very readily. I seldom show this variety because it drops its calyx. It won the Harris Award in 1978.

'Valentine Day Variegated' is a hybrid between 'Crimson Robe' and 'Tiffany'. The variegation was a surprise for it never shows variegation of the foliage. It is a vigorous grower and combines the growing characteristics of its two parents. An interesting note about this cultivar is that it is nearly impossible to graft. I only know two people who have successfully done this. A number of years ago I grafted onto an established plant in the ground and it is still growing. Several years ago Sergio Bracci was successful with two out of four grafts. Numerous people have attempted to graft this without success. Why? It does explain why Nuccios have

never offered 'Valentine Day Variegated' for sale. It has been my most successful show entry, especially in the "multiple" category. It has won more times than I can count, but I remember my bloom won over the Braccis' bloom twice, which many of you know was hard to do. The blooms don't shatter when they drop.

'Valentine Day' has won numerable awards including the Harris Award in 1972, the Charlotte C. Knox award in 1998, ACS National Hall of Fame in 1980, the RHS Award of Merit in 1975, and the Frank L. Storment Award in 1982.

'Francie L.' is a cross between C. Saluenensis 'Apple Blossom' and C. reticulata 'Buddah'. This has produced one of the best crosses. It is the most vigorous of all my plants and has grown through the lath top many times. I highly recommend it for any garden; its growth pattern is quite compact but very vigorous. The flowers drop whole and it sometimes sets seed. It is the most awarded plant in my collection-the Aubrev Harris Award in 1969, the Edward H. Metcalf Award in 1967, the ACS National Hall of Fame (the initial selection) in 1978, the RHS Award of Merit in 1872 and the William E. Woodroof Hall of Fame Award in 1980.



'Miss Tulare' is a seedling of C. reticulata 'Crimson Robe'. This is my selection as a first choice reticulata for any collection because it has so many excellent attributes. One, it is nice and compact just like a japonica. Two, it drops its blooms whole and, three, in spite of being a rose form to full peony flower, it readily sets seed. This makes it a good parent for any hybridizer. The one thing to be careful of is that the branches are slightly brittle. In spite of these top qualities, it has been awarded very few times and only received the the Frank L. Storment Award in 1979 and the Harris award in 1989.

'Mandalay Queen' is a 'Tali Queen' seedling. Considering its very wide-open growth, it is most likely a self cross. It is a very rapid grower and is the only one of my retics not grown under lath but grows in the open. It drops its blooms mostly whole and sets seeds frequently. It has won the Aubrey Harris Award in 1975 and the Frank L. Storment Award in 1970.

Editor's note: You may have been as surprised as I to read that Gene only waters three times a year. What we need to remember is that Gene doesn't live far from the Pacific Ocean so the in his area humidity would be quite a bit higher than for those of us who live farther inland.

## FUN WITH NON-RETICULATAS

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At the Pacific Camellia Society show earlier this year Alexis Slafer and I were arranging the nonreticulata hybrid section for the final judging. There was a 'Tiptoe' and a 'Tulip Time' in contention. That combination reminded us of the song "Tiptoe Through the Tulips." As we looked at the names of some of the other blooms in that category, a little story began to emerge of a 'Demure' young lass on 'Tiptoe' as she journeyed through the tulip patch. Filled with 'Anticipation', she expected to see her 'Super Star' soon-and, just perhaps, a 'Honeymoon' was on the horizon.

Several years ago one of our camellia ladies from Northern California wrote poems about the women in her husband's life— 'Eleanor Martin Supreme', 'Margaret Davis', 'Betty Foy Sanders' and others. A husband might write about the men in his wife's life—'Ed Combatalade', 'Harold L. Paige' and, of course, the handsome 'Frank Houser'! Sometimes camellia lovers become a bit weird! Some may think that description fits your Editor well!

## TEN YEARS OF GRATITUDE FOR A GREAT GARDENING PARTNER Linda Tunner

When the first plane struck the World Trade Center, the flight destined for Los Angeles, my husband Joe heard of the event, probably by word of mouth at his company from someone who was monitoring the internet. He called home to tell me to turn on the TV. This was the only reason that I witnessed the second plane hitting the North Tower on live TV because the networks had finally tuned in and a passerby had it on a cell-phone. Cell phones back then were much more rare. I know that Joe didn't have one. He often flew into LAX and took a shuttle limo home.

I was appalled that the California destinations of all four flights were from closely located and regulated East Coast airports (2 Boston, 1 Newark and 1 WA), if you can believe it! Flight Number AA 11 to LAX, Flight Number UA 175 to LAX, Flight Number AA 77 to LAX and Flight Number UA 93 to SFO. I was SO immensely grateful that Joe was not commuting that day and that he did not die.

It was common in those days for him to fly all over the place for the companies that he worked for. In fact, one of the most powerful memories that I recall in the days after 9/11 is being aware of the absence of air flights over our home when all the non-essential flights were grounded. We live close to the Carlsbad airport and many of those planes fly nearby. Being outdoors seemed so peaceful. Joe often went to the East Coast, as far as Pennsylvania and I know he looked forward to his flight home to our family. I was happy for the change in attitude of companies that he worked for-they valued him so much that they were reluctant to let him on a plane to anywhere.

On the recent weekend anniversary of that 9/11 tragedy which could have changed our lives and didn't, Joe and I worked together to plant some "memorial" camellias. On 9/10 we decided to plant the very rare and desirable 'Debbie'. On 9/11, we planted 'China Doll', 'Nannie Brown', 'Roma Resort' and 'Marie Mackall'. These camellias were grafts from generous gifts of scions from Howard and Mary Rhodes. If you do not know these people, I can only describe them as the Sergio and Elsie Bracci of the Florida circuit. They have been more than generous with their plant material, and we thank them for it.

Joe and I did not set out to make our 10th anniversary a 9/11 memento. Rather, it seemed to come gradually to us as we each realized how horrible that day could have been. I will never again be comfortable when Joe is on a plane again, knowing that the evils of that day could come to call again. I look forward to a time, especially with all the video technology that exists now, that he can talk to his business contacts and tell them, among other things, about the new camellias, which keep him grounded.

## A GOOD MOTHER IS HARD TO FIND Story and Photos by Gene Phillips

<sup>°</sup>Most of us treasure the memories of days gone by growing up with our mothers carefully guiding us and trying desperately to keep us out of trouble. Even though my mother passed away almost twenty years ago, I still think of her often and wonder what she would think about how her little boy turned out.

In the camellia world, mothers are important, too. Many camellias are good seed setters, but not all of these

seed setters produce interesting and different camellia seedlings. You never know what you are going to get when you plant a camellia seed. In addition to hybridizing camellias, I plant many

open pollinated seed to see how they will turn out. Usually, I will note the seed parent when I plant the seed, so that maybe I will find one mother plant that seems to have an abundance of unusual and beautiful camellia children.

In the camellia world, a good mother is hard to find. Everyone who plants seed or does hybridization has their own idea about what makes a good mother plant. Hulyn Smith swore by his mother plant of 'Suzanne Withers'. It is perfect for breeding the kind of hybrid seedlings that Hulyn found appealing. Lillian and Clarence Gordy plant many camellia seed every year, and they have found 'Edna Campbell' to be an outstanding mother plant. The list can go on and on. A great mother plant can be determined by what the individual grower is looking to find

in their seedlings.

For me, my best mother plant is a hybrid called 'Yume'. This fallblooming variety was introduced by Nuccio's Nurseries of Altadena, California back in 1995. It is a cross of *C. hiemalis* 'Shishi-Gashira' X *C. yuhsienensis* developed by Dr. Kaoru Hagiya. To those who don't look closely, this variety would be considered just another slow growing sasanqua but, to me, it has magical

> powers as a mother plant. The most

Ine most unusual characteristic of 'Yume' is its alternating color combination of white and pink on its petals. This strange way of displaying its floral colors is a little different than

you normally see in sasanquas. What is really different is how the color combinations display on the children of 'Yume'. Keep in mind that I have only begun my journey with this outstanding mother, so I have only seen limited results. However, if the preliminary results continue, I could be happy to just plant seed from 'Yume' alone.

All of my 'Yume' seedlings so far have been open pollinated crosses the bees and moths have done all the work so far. I suspect that the pollen parents were other sasanquas or sasanqua hybrids blooming in the garden at the same time. Some of these 'Yume' seedlings grow with extreme vigor which is very different from their mother, and others have more of a dwarf or spreading growth characteristic.

The most notable characteristic is



the floral color expressions that have developed. To find this many different expressions coming from the open pollinated seedlings of one mother plant really gets my attention. I am very interested in developing what I call "Sasangua Type Plants." Since what we normally think of as sasanquas are really hybrids, this concept of mine does not limit me to what would be thought of as sasanqua or hiemalis varieties. I am looking for fall bloomers on great looking plants with masses of showy blooms. Any improvements in the "Wow" factor make this type of plant even more appealing.

So far, I have seen color combinations that vary from the basic pink and white colors of 'Yume' to lavender pink-striped flowers. The forms are variable—from simple single to full double or loose peony. Much of the form may be influenced by the pollen parent or father plant, but the color combinations are likely coming from the genetic lines of 'Yume'.

I have several varieties that I have already named, but none of my 'Yume' seedlings have been commercially released so far. One of my favorites is a striped variety that I have named 'Marshall' in honor of my nephew. It is a spectacular landscape shrub with awesome flowers.

Another seedling of 'Yume' that I like is one that I have named 'Isabel



Cordelia'. A friend of mine was talking to me several years ago about camellias. He was telling me about

his beautiful granddaughter with a beautiful name. He said that he thought it would be wonderful to name a camellia after his young granddaughter, so she could go through life knowing that a lovely flower was named in her honor. This how my 'Yume' seedling became



known as 'Isabel Cordelia'. Another of my favorite 'Yume' seedlings is called 'Strawberries 'N Cream'. It is a spectacular combination of the 'Yume' pink and white colors, but reconfigured to express itself on a full double flower. You can see the white open on the bud to look as though it was pealed back to show off the pink center.



A lovely seedling of 'Yume' that I really like is one I've called 'Tsubaki's Princess Emily'. I just really like the name "Emily," and such a captivating landscape plant would have to be named for a princess. This thinking probably shows how my strange mind works, but you can get the picture.



I have more seedlings of 'Yume' to further evaluate and some to see bloom for the first time. I plan to plant more seeds from this interesting camellia. A good mother is hard to find so, if you are looking for one, give 'Yume' a try. You will be glad you did. Hopefully, some of these new varieties can be introduced commercially within a few years.

Editor's note: Does this make you want to rush out to buy 'Yume' plants to start your own seedling collection?

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

## CARE OF NEWLY GRAFTED PLANTS Marilee Gray

Place tightly covered plant in a warm area with good indirect light **not in sunlight.** Moisture condensation inside the bag during the cooler parts of the day indicates a good, tight cover. Keep tightly covered until new growth is initiated an inch or more. Generally, this takes about two to four months. Remove bag occasionally to check graft and to remove all growth nodes that start from the understock. Replace the bag.

The root should be kept on the dry side or the root will fail. Water seldom and sparingly—1 cup when the pot holes appear dry.

Slowly expose and harden new growth by snipping tiny holes in the bag. If the new growth wilts, tape holes closed and try again in a couple of weeks. If the new growth tolerates the initial exposure, gradually increase the exposure by opening more holes every few days until the top of the bag has been thoroughly perforated. Try to avoid hardening tender growth during hot spells. Once the plant is fully exposed and growing, water just enough to keep the soil moist—**not wet**. Wait until fall to use a very light sprinkling of 2-10-10 fertilizer, or wait until next spring to feed lightly with cottonseed meal.
