THE COVER FLOWER

C. JAPONICA 'WILLIAM JACKSON'

'William Jackson' is an eight year old 'Tiffany' seedling that first bloomed in 1968. It was originated and propagated by William B. Jackson, Jackson's Nursery and Floral of Tyler, Texas. Flowers are very large, red with fuchsia overlay, loose to full peony predominating with occasional anemone and semi-double forms. Blooms are early to late.
